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
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What have we done this week

What have we been doing this week?

Welcome back from the Easter Break! We hope you had a fantastic Easter filled with joy, laughter, and maybe even some chocolatey treats!

This term our topic is "Once Upon a Time" and this week we have started with the classic tale of "The Three Little Pigs." From huffing and puffing to building sturdy houses, Reception have been immersed in the magic of storytelling!

During our Explore and Learn sessions, we have been on a mission to construct the sturdiest houses. We have explored and experimented with various materials. But beware of the big bad wolf! We have also made our own playdough, following a simple recipe and created the characters from the story, we talked about the features of our characters and complimented each other's playdough creations!

Reception have also been busy re-enacting the tale of the Three Little Pigs, stepping into the shoes of each character to explore the story and using actions for, 'first', 'next' and 'finally'.

In Maths lessons this week, our focus has been on counting larger amounts. Through careful counting and great discussions, we've been exploring various strategies to conquer even the biggest of numbers!

We can't wait to continue our journey through fairy tales and learning adventures this term and have lots of magical moments planned!

What have we been doing this week?

This half term our topic is 'Bright Ideas'. To hook us in, we started by being Scientists, Explorers, Artists and Engineers. Each class tried the dancing raisins experiment with Mrs Hilton, built bridges using uncooked spaghetti and sticky marshmallows with Mr Goulding-Stewart, explored how to grow a rainbow with Mrs Currie, and did blow art with Miss Barker.

In History this week we have been learning about The Great Exhibition, an international exhibition which took place in London in 1851. We talked about how The Great Exhibition was a grand event in the Victorian Age, when Queen Victoria reigned over England. The children were very excited to learn that Queen Victoria became Queen when she was just 18 years old and she was also very short! In Maths this week we have been measuring length and height. We began by comparing our own height with each other and working out who the tallest pupil in the class was.

In English this week we have enjoyed the story 'Mrs Armitage on Wheels', by Quentin Blake. In the story Mrs Armitage adds parts to her bike to make it better. We retold the story in a number of different ways.

Year 2 News

In English this week we have written a recount about things we did during our Easter holiday, we have clearly had lots of fun and also been able to relax! We have read 'The Koala who could' and made predictions about how the story might end. We have also sequenced the story and acted out parts of it, which we really enjoyed.

In Maths we have been learning how to measure accurately using a ruler and making sure that we start measuring from '0'. We had fun measuring objects around the classroom and comparing these lengths using <, > and = .

We have begun our topic on Australia and have enjoyed learning a song about the features of Australia during our Music lesson. We have been able to compare the population size and this prompted a lot of discussion about what we know already.

Beyond the Gate - Forest School

It has been lovely to see the Year One children back Beyond the Gate in the spring sun.

Mrs Dear challenged the children with a flora scavenger hunt. First of all, they were given a map of the site and used map reading skills to locate features such as the bell tent, shed, swamp, mud kitchen and bug skyscraper.





Each map had a star on it - in a different location – and the children had to follow the map to find the correct place. They then had to identify the plant which was growing in that location by reading a name label. They had to tell Mrs Dear the correct plant name for that point and then were given a different map. They loved this challenge and hopefully can tell you the name of some plants found around our site!

After this, the children were free to play and explore as they wished. Some children chose to continue their plant identification by leaf bashing and labelling, or col-

lecting a leaf, cutting it in half and drawing the other half.

Amongst many different forms of free play, Mrs Dear observed one group of children making a seesaw and heard their independent risk assessment discussions: "be careful – I don't think it is safe yet!"; "We need a team to help make it safer!"; "we need 4 people to lift that,"; "let's be builders and build a park!"
